In 1881, George Pullman created what he hoped would be an ideal manufacturing community on the far south side of Chicago.

The factory complex, surrounded by company housing, was dedicated to the manufacturing and servicing of passenger cars.

Located on the far south side of Chicago, the town was designed as an “ideal community” and was intended by Pullman to solve all of the ills of then-modern manufacturing and housing.


The town housed as many as 8,000 workers and their families. It was rented from the Pullman Company until a Supreme Court order forced the company to sell the houses to private individuals in 1907.

98% of the housing stock is still extant and being lived in; the town of Pullman was annexed by the city of Chicago and remains a strong and vibrant community.





The PSHS is committed to putting all of its collection online to form a virtual museum. It uses custom software for a digital presentation and curation.

The software uses MySQL for indexes, XML records for the data, and Perl interfaces for both.



**The Pullman House History Project**

### Maps of Pullman

Most of the maps presented below are from the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps, 1911 edition. Click on the small copy of the maps to bring up a detailed, larger map of the area. The maps are linked into the house history database, so clicking on a property will make a database query. For comparison, we have also included a few Rascher's maps of Pullman, Cook County, Illinois, from 1886 that cover a similar area. Properties that are referenced in the database are indicated as a house and its surrounding yard.

#### 1882 Hyde Park Township Maps

One of the most beautiful maps of Pullman, the 1882 Hyde Park Township plat map was hand colored. Mr. Pullman would not allow the map makers onto "his" property, so they were forced to guess at where things were located using drawings and photographs. Notice on the southern map, there is an older development (pre-Pullman) platted.

#### 1886 Rascher Maps

Charles Rascher was a German surveyor who immigrated to Chicago sometime after 1871. He first established a surveying business after the 1871 Chicago Fire. By the 1880's he had developed his surveying company into a map making company and published maps of the developing city. Rascher's Map of Chicago and other parts of the Midwest were published between 1882 and 1893 from the [Chicago Branch of Pullman](#).


6 SCROLL DETAIL AT PANEL


