My Role:

The Knowledge River Steering Committee provides leadership, advisory recommendations, and direction for the UA SIRLS Knowledge River program – a program that provides scholarship assistance to library students of Hispanic or Native American background. As a past recipient of a Knowledge River scholarship, I was pleased to receive an invitation to serve on the steering committee and make a contribution through professional service. I attended the annual meeting in 2008, 2009, and 2011; and participated on 2010's Skype virtual meeting where we gave input for grant submissions. I reviewed scholarship applications and scored the applicants, and then finalized the recipients for the 2009 and 2010 awards. The Steering Committee was successful in assisting with grant development to secure additional funding from IMLS' Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program in the amount of nearly \$900,000.

For 2011, the Steering Committee worked with other Knowledge River graduates, the SIRLS office as well as UA Libraries to coordinate "Celebrating 10 Years of Knowledge River at the University of Arizona!" in conjunction with the 2011 Knowledge River Steering Committee meeting held in early November. I participated on two different panels for the Celebrating 10 Years conference: 1) How I Landed my First Librarian Job; 2) Taking it Up a Notch: Career Advancement for Diverse Mid-Career Professionals. Both presentations has nearly 35 participants attending consisting of members of various KR cohorts including the current 2011 cohort. Knowledge River Mentoring Program Guidelines

Purpose

The purpose of the Knowledge River Mentoring Program is to provide professional and personal development, inspiration, and encouragement through a supportive mentoring relationship. The specific goals of the program include:

- To provide guidance and coaching to new and future LIS professionals in their careers and growth as professionals.
- To foster leadership in LIS professional associations.
- To help mentees become more knowledgeable about the LIS profession and opportunities from the
 perspectives of Latino and Native Americans and advocates for culturally sensitive library and
 information services to these communities.

Guidelines for Protégés and Mentors

- The mentoring arrangement will last from January 14, 2012 Dec 31, 2012, although mentors and mentees may continue the arrangement after this time on their own.
- Mentors and mentees should communicate at least once a month and meet in person at least once during the year, preferably at a conference such as ALA Annual Conference. Contact can include, but is not limited to, email, phone calls, Skype, in person. We realize that due to economic constraints, meeting face-to-face may not be possible. However it is still strongly recommended.
- When geographically possible, mentors are encouraged to invite/meet their mentee at professional meetings, conferences, and workshops. (This constitutes no financial obligation for mentors)
- At any time during the duration of the mentoring arrangement, the mentee or mentor may contact the Mentoring Chair for assistance.
- Participation is voluntary for both mentor and mentee.
- The Committee will attempt to match participants by interest and/or geographic proximity.
- Participants may request a specific mentoring partner; the Committee will try to accommodate such requests. These requests will also be kept confidential.
- If either party feels there has been a mismatch, the Mentoring Chair will be called on to help resolve the situation

It's been an incredibly busy year and a very productive year for the students and the KR program. Twelve of the thirteen students from cohort 7 have graduated as of August 2010. The only student remaining is going strong after taking a leave of absence for medical reasons. Five students from Cohort 8 plan to graduate this December. The rest plan to graduate either in May of 2011, or take a little more time to complete the DigIn Certificate. I get regular emails from potential students who are interested in applying. It's very exciting!

We've had students attending conferences and being highly involved with student extracurricular activities here at SIRLS. One current student, Mariaelena de la Rosa, was recently named an ARL Diversity Scholar. We've gotten KR alumni Luis Franciso Vargas (Yuma Public Library), Melanie Toledo (Ak-Chin Tribal Library) and SIRLS alum Oscar Hernandez (Pascua Yaqui's Dr. Fernando Escalante Community Library and Resources Center) heavily involved with the required KR Class

(IRLS 550: Information Environments from Hispanic and Native American Perspectives). We've been working on a grant-funded project to begin capturing the oral histories of AZ's tribal libraries. We're partnering with the University Libraries on a November 2nd seminar titled "Research with Respect: Ethical Approaches to Native American Cultural Research and Archival Practices." Students are plugging away at courses and their graduate assistantships, and I'm very much enjoying having an opportunity to get to know them. Last night we made sugar skulls for Dia de los Muertos, and as an informal social gathering/cohort building activity. You can see photos of this, and other events and KR news on Facebook.

We've been working on the IMLS grant to submit in December, incorporating a lot of what was discussed at last year's meeting. Our aim is to continue to build on the success of the cohort model, bring an increased emphasis the cultural components of the curriculum and online learning environments, and expanding opportunities for students' preparation to serve under-served communities. Richard Chabran and I have been working closely to put this together, with assistance from SIRLS Director Bryan Heidorn and input from various stakeholders, including SIRLS faculty and partners. Students repeatedly tell me that they gain valuable experience from their Graduate Assistantships, so I want to do whatever I can to continue this part of the program. They also enjoy the cohort building that happens in the program, so I want to build on this successful part of the program. I'm also in the middle of collecting responses from KR alumni on their experinces as students, and to report on where they are now. I'm working with a KR grad assistant on exit surveys to be used to gather data from all KR students as they graduate. And I'm getting ready to do my fall semester check in with all the current students. All of this information contributes to the grant writing.

We'd like to share with you our progress on this grant before we submit it in December. I'd like to propose a virtual meeting in November for the steering committee (via Skype or Elluminate).
