

**CONGRATULATIONS!!!!** Alisa Kushner, program coordinator for the Nebraska Internship Consortium in Professional Psychology (NICPP) and the Counseling and School Psychology Clinic in the Department of Educational Psychology, has been named the recipient of the latest Staff Star Award by the College of Education and Human Sciences Staff Council. The NICPP is the largest predoctoral internship program in the United States. In her role, Kushner assists over 50 interns with moving to Nebraska, finding housing and getting settled. She also manages the intern handbook, evaluation forms and other documentation. It's estimated that

Kushner's work has saved each of the 11 NICPP supervisors a minimum of 15-20 hours of professional time annually. "She has been the consistent presence 'behind the scenes' in making sure that our nationally prominent and accredited internship program is reliably administered and meets and exceeds all standards for our performance," wrote one of Kushner's nominators. During the coronavirus pandemic, Kushner rapidly transitioned the consortium's face-to-face meetings to virtual delivery. She was committed to developing new and alternative strategies to ensure the trainings were delivered on schedule without sacrificing quality. She also helped the Counseling and School Psychology Clinic setup a touchless check-out system using QR codes, making the process of accessing clinic materials safer and more secure. "The Consortium and the Clinic would not function without Alisa," wrote another nominator. "She is an invaluable asset and is

very, very deserving of the CEHS Staff Star Award."



- For Counseling and School Psychology students applying for pre-doctoral internship: Please know that some sites require COVID vaccinations. If you're not vaccinated, you need to know that this will potentially limit your internship opportunities. Please see the notice from APPIC:
  - OVID vaccinations are, of course, an emotionally and politically charged issue for many of us. Regardless of one's personal beliefs about the topic, the fact remains that some individuals have significant medical concerns, deeply-held religious beliefs, or other factors that make the decision about vaccination a complicated one -- even moreso given that many agencies are implementing policies and requirements in this area.
  - At the same time, we are seeing many sites adopt policies that require their employees, including
    interns and postdocs, to be vaccinated. We are hearing that some sites are granting exceptions
    (e.g., based on religious, medical, or other grounds) or accommodations (e.g., working from home
    or via telehealth), but we are also hearing that some sites are NOT granting exceptions or
    accommodations for any reason.
  - APPIC requires sites to inform applicants about policies that are relevant to eligibility for

- appointment, and vaccination policies certainly fall into that category. Training Directors are
  reminded to please keep their public materials updated to reflect policy developments in this area.
  However, in the current rapidly-shifting environment, policies may not yet exist, or are under review,
  or are changing, and thus many sites may not be able to provide guidance as to how their vaccination
  policies will look in the Fall of 2022 when their next training class begins.
- Applicants who have decided not to get the COVID vaccine, and who do not wish to be vaccinated during their internship or postdoctoral year, may need to make some difficult choices with regard to their participation in the upcoming Match process.
- The APPIC Board would like to provide the following guidelines to all applicants for the coming year:
  - Most importantly, don't make assumptions about any site. If a site's published materials are silent on its vaccination policies, you should not assume that you will be allowed to work at the site without being vaccinated. Nor should you assume that a policy won't be established in the coming weeks and months.
  - For sites that require vaccination of its employees, you should not assume that you will be granted an exemption, nor should you assume that certain accommodations will be provided.
  - It is imperative that you talk directly with the site to understand their current policies as well as the possibility of policies changing in the future.
  - Students seeking internship should only rank sites for which they have confirmed that their vaccination status will be acceptable to those sites. Individuals seeking postdoctoral positions should only accept a position if they have confirmed the acceptability of their vaccination status with that site.
  - If a site's vaccination polices change after you have been placed at that site, you will likely be required to conform to the site's new policy. Failure to do so may result in being terminated from the training program. While APPIC can assist in attempting to negotiate solutions in such situations, vaccination policies are often established at the Federal or State level and thus there may be little to no flexibility.

     The funds are unrestricted provided that they support the execution of the dissertation project.
  - One recommendation letter from a supervising faculty member/mentor documenting his/her support for the student's research, the student's potential, and any existing resources available for the student's research. The recommendation letter may be included in the uploaded single PDF file, or may be e-mailed separately to RouthAward@sccap53.org.

#### **NEWS**

• Dr. Michael Rutter passed away on October 23rd. He was widely considered to be one of the most influential researchers on child mental health of the last 50 years. His work transformed understanding of deprivation and its effects, as well as produced major insights into autism, depression, antisocial behavior, hyperactivity and learning disorders. He is credited with establishing the study of child mental health on a firm scientific foundation. Dr. Rutter is the author of over 500 papers and 40 books. Among his most influential works is Maternal Deprivation Reassessed (1972), which presented evidence that young children often form multiple attachments rather than a selective attachment to just the primary caretaker and that these attachments can serve as the basis of resiliency in the event of the loss of the primary caretaker. In the 1990s, Rutter led research teams that followed Romanian orphans who were adopted in Western Europe and North America. He identified the conditions under which infants and children who had suffered severe deprivation could attain normal mental health and cognitive function. This work now serves as a basis for adoption policies throughout the world. Rutter also played an important role in establishing and overseeing institutions that support high-quality scientific research on child mental health. He founded the MRC Child Psychiatry Research Unit in 1984 and the MRC Social, Genetic and Developmental Psychiatry Centre in 1994, and he continues to serve on governing and advisory boards of various research and health organizations. He was a foreign associate member of the National Academy of Sciences, American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and US National Academy of Education. He received an Honorary Doctorate from over 15 institutions, was knighted by the Queen of England in 1992, and was the recipient of the American Psychological Association Distinguished Scientific Contribution Award in 1995.
