





- The Counseling & School Psychology Clinic and Department of Educational Psychology wants to support end-of-semester self-care and relaxation. - CSPC student-clinicians and licensed Psychologists: A major new report by legal and medical experts from Yale Law School, the Yale School of Medicine's Child Study Center and Departments of Psychiatry and Pediatrics, and the University of Texas Southwestern analyzes in depth the misleading scientific claims that informed recent actions by Texas and Alabama to criminalize medical treatment for transgender youth. The report, "Biased Science: The Texas and Alabama Measures Criminalizing Medical Treatment for Transgender Children and Adolescents Rely on Inaccurate and Misleading Scientific Statements," represents the first comprehensive examination of the Texas Attorney General opinion and Alabama legislation targeting gender-affirming medical care for transgender children and adolescents. The report strongly refutes the misguided scientific claims that inform the measures in both states and contends that the Texas and Alabama authorities omitted important evidence demonstrating the benefits of treatment for gender dysphoria and exaggerated potential harms, painting "a warped picture" of the scientific evidence. Though a number of scientific and professional organizations have denounced the Texas and Alabama actions, the report by a team of seven experts in science, medicine, and law presents the first point-by-point rebuttal. - CSPC Student-Clinicians and Supervising Faculty: Rutgers Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology invites all Div 53 members to attend our "lunch and learn" Zoom webinar, "An Acceptance and Commitment Therapy Approach to Managing Stress for Children and Teenagers", presented by Dr. Erica Lander Miller. The training will be held on Monday May 16th from 12pm-1:30pm EST and provides 1.5 CE credits.
  - These are not easy times to be a student. Our children and teenagers are navigating through developmental and life stressors that manifest in increasing rates of mental health problems. In addition to the typical developmental and life stressors that our students have to navigate, they are now trying to do so in the midst of the additional stressors brought on by the pandemic and the associated isolation and reduction of structure and support. The focus of this training will be on applying Acceptance and Commitment Therapy to help children and teenagers manage stress through both mindfulness strategies and change based strategies. ACT is an empirically based intervention that balances behavioral change strategies with acceptance-based mindfulness strategies with the goal of increasing psychological flexibility. Clients gain the skills to both contextualize and accept their thoughts, feelings, behaviors, and physical sensations while also clarifying their values to help them engage in meaningful actions. You will be able to leave this training with tools and conceptualizations that can be brought right into your sessions the same day.

- EDPS Graduate Students: Temporary On-Call Program Facilitator (100% remote work for CYFS)
  - o The individuals in this position will co-facilitate an online program for LGBTQIA2S+ youth ages 15 to 18. The program (PRYSHM [Promoting Resilient Youth with Strong Hearts and Minds]) aims to facilitate LGBTQIA2S+ teens feeling affirmed, accepted, and a sense of pride about their LGBTQIA2S+ identities. The main, desired outcome of the program is to embolden and empower participating youth to make healthy decisions consistent with their personal values, hopes, and goals for the future. Prior to co-facilitating the program, facilitators will be intensively trained by the program team. Facilitators will also participate in weekly, 1-hour supervision sessions during the program to improve facilitation skills. Program sessions are all online (via Zoom) and will be during the evenings and on weekends. This position is a temporary, on-call position; hours will be variable. Online program sessions will occur during time convenient for youth (weekends and evenings), so it is required that the person in this position have regular availability during this time. The individuals in this position DO NOT need to be located in Lincoln, NE. This work will be done 100% remotely.
  - Preference will be given to applicants who have experience working with LGBTQIA2S+ youth in professional settings as well as individuals with previous experience teaching, facilitating programs, and/or leading programming with diverse youth. Also, given the target population (i.e., LGBTQIA2S+), it is required that the person in this position have extensive knowledge of and/or engagement with the LGBTQIA2S+ community. Facilitators must also pass a background check.
  - The minimum qualification is high school or GED.

- CSPC student-clinicians and licensed psychologists: Rutgers Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology invites all Div 53 members to attend our CE Zoom webinar, "Domestic Violence vs. High-Conflict: Impact on Children and Adults", presented by Drs. Sharon Montgomery and Marcy Pasternak. The training will be held on Friday June 10th from 12pm-4:30pm EST and provides 4 CE credits.
  - This webinar will provide an understanding of domestic violence, and will differentiate between domestic violence, child abuse, and high conflict dynamics in adults and children. Recommended protocols and screening tools for clinicians will be discussed and reviewed. The latest research regarding the impact of domestic violence and high-conflict dynamics on children and adults will be addressed. The importance of distinguishing between domestic violence and situational high conflict will be highlighted as well as the recommended interventions and treatment for both. Familiarity with the different typologies within domestic violence and high conflict, as well as the prevalence and dynamics of domestic violence and intimate partner violence among diverse populations, will also be discussed. The presenters will include data regarding race, ethnicity, gender identity, sexual orientation, age, disability, socio-economic status, and religious affiliations. Case examples will be presented and discussed.


